Dan remembers climbing the trees that once grew in the parking lot and playing stick ball against the school building. "Mr. French would often go up on the roof and throw down dozens of balls that had been stuck up there during many a game in the school yard."

Dan and his wife Lisa have been married for nine years and are the proud parents of Lauren, a current 1st Grader at St. Dorothy School, and four-year-old Samantha, who attends preschool at Ancona Montessori School. Dan owns a State Farm Insurance Agency in Philadelphia. He has been with the company for 24 years and has had his own agency for the last fourteen. "I have been fortunate to be with the same employer since college."



Guess Who Just Got a New iPad? Our Entire 8th Grade!!!

St. Dorothy School has acquired Apple iPads for each of our eighth grade students which reflects our ongoing commitment to reinforce and enhance student learning through the use of technology. This comprehensive multimedia learning tool is providing many opportunities for our students to explore topics at a greater depth, and the knowledge gained so far exceeds that which could be acquired only through textbooks. iPads allow students to engage with content interactively, to find information quickly and efficiently, and they inspire creativity.

In science students have researched the types of volcanoes and learned the eruptions most commonly associated with each. They located active volcanoes in different regions of the world and mapped their latitude and longitude coordinates. Using the iPads, they live-streamed video showing the different eruptions. As the students conducted their research, they switched to the note taking app to record their findings.

In social studies students explored the immigration experience from 1880 through 1920. They visited the Ellis Island, Angel Island, and U.S. Customs websites to gain information. Their research culminated in their creating a biography of an imaginary immigrant.

Teaching Our Children Good Manners

This school year St. Dorothy School offered an after-school etiquette class for second through fourth graders. The idea originated with school principal Mrs. Sheehan (her granddaughter had taken an etiquette class at her school) and a parent who had observed an after-school enrichment program at a local elementary school. Together they agreed that an etiquette class would be a great way to start a similar enrichment program at St. Dorothy.

The class is taught by two parent volunteers who brushed up on their etiquette by reading *Emily Post's The Guide to Good Manners for Kids* by Peggy Post and Cin-

dy Post Senning. The six-week class culminates in a class party where the students put to use their newly-learned table manners. They practice setting the table, twirling pasta correctly, and cutting a gummy worm by holding the fork and knife the right way.

Students make place mats which list table manners such as: place your napkin on your lap, wait for the host (or the person who prepared the meal) to sit down before eating, ask to be excused, and do not criticize the food. In other lessons, students learn the importance of writing thank you notes and have the chance to create their own set of thank you cards.

Proper phone manners are learned through role play on "fake" phones. Students realize the importance of washing their hands prior to a meal by looking at their hands under a black light. This allows students to see the germs on their hands prior to washing (a scary thought!) and the difference after washing. Lastly, students learn and practice a proper greeting, how to introduce friends to adults, and the importance of a firm handshake.

Riley Sweet, a participant in the class said, "It is so much fun we almost learn every manner in the world." Due to the success of this class Mrs. Sheehan is seeking others in the St. Dorothy community to share their talents and knowledge by developing other classes for our newly formed after-school enrichment program.
